Portfolio Review Elements: Social Accountability for Roma Health (2013-2015); Participants: Raluca Bunea, Maja Jovanovic, and Rosalind McKenna, Public Health Program; Presidential Portfolio Review: April 28, 2016

NOTE: Rationale for reviewing a partial Category of Work

As has been discussed previously with the President, we have decided to base this portfolio review on a partial category of work. The work under review began as a single concept before we adopted the new CoW structure and taxonomy in 2015. Since then, the work has been integrated into a larger body of work that we conceptualize as "Accountability and Leadership for Roma Health Rights," which includes components of social and legal accountability, as well as leadership development. For learning purposes, it made more sense to define this portfolio review according to how the work was defined when we began it.

In this portfolio, we advanced work to support marginalized Roma communities to hold their governments accountable to health related commitments by using social accountability methods, such as community monitoring, social audit, and budget monitoring. Three main elements were used in this portfolio: (I) project grants for implementing social accountability approaches; (II) technical assistance for testing and scaling up the social accountability approaches through consultancies, convening, and peer exchange visits; and (III) grants for the development of advocacy capacity and media advocacy tools. This review covers a three-year span from 2013-2015, but the work continues in the context of the enlarged concept described above.

(I) Project grants for implementing social accountability approaches (\$1,369,805)

These grants supported Roma-led and Roma-focused NGOs in Bulgaria, Macedonia, and Romania, to test and expand the community monitoring approaches to holding governments accountable to their health related commitments. They also included support to the early adopters of social accountability approaches to disseminate these to other NGOs. In the period from 2013 to 2015 thirteen organizations received project grant support. (\$1,369,805)

(II) Technical assistance for testing and scaling up the social accountability approaches through consultancies, convenings, and peer exchange visits (\$193,346)

These operational activities engaged external experts to provide support with learning, adapting, and initial testing of the social accountability approach. They included peer exchange visits to India and Romania and annual convenings for learning and assessment of progress. A total of ten organizations implementing social accountability work for advancing Roma health from Bulgaria, Macedonia and Romania benefited from this support. (\$193,346)

(III) Grants for the development of advocacy capacity and media advocacy tools (\$74.775)

These grants supported social accountability grantees in Bulgaria, Macedonia, and Romania to develop printed and digital materials in support of their advocacy to promote access to health services for the most marginalized Roma communities. Nine organizations received support for the development of media advocacy tools. (\$74,775)
