**UK and Dutch Voters kick off European elections.** Voters in the Netherlands and Britain on Thursday kick-started the European election, which is expected to produce a surge in support for populist parties and pose a serious challenge to mainstream politicians in the European Parliament. In the biggest exercise in democracy outside India, up to 350m are eligible to vote over the next days in 28 countries. The results will be announced on Sunday evening once all the polls are closed. *The Financial Times, 22 May* 2014

Merkel: Voters elect next commission chief 'in principle' German Chancellor Angela Merkel on Thursday (22 May) made conciliatory gestures towards the European Parliament on the choice of the next commission president after Sunday's EU elections. In an interview with Passauer Neue Presse, Merkel said that voters in the EU elections can bring their contribution to furthering the European project. "A clear qualitative improvement is that, in principle, the Commission president gets elected," she said. EUobserver, 22 May 2014.

<u>Europhiles take the lead in Dutch EU elections, exit polls show.</u> Geert Wilders' populist Freedom Party (PVV) has suffered an electoral blow in The Netherlands' EU elections, while the pro-European liberal party D66 is expected to claim the largest number of seats, according to an exit poll released on Thursday (22 May). At a rally last week near the Palace of Versailles, France's largest far-right party, the National Front, deployed all the familiar theatrics and populist themes of nationalist movements across Europe. But the event, part of an energetic push for votes by France's surging far right ahead of elections this week for the European Parliament, also promoted an agenda distant from the customary concerns of conservative voters: why Europe needs to break its "submission" to the United States and look to Russia as a force for peace and a bulwark against moral decay.
