Your right to vote abroad

European Citizens Abroad have launched an <u>explainer video</u> to educate and advocate on the right to vote, and encourage all European citizens living abroad to vote in May 2014.

<u>New Europeans</u> have also started an online campaign to raise awareness of the EU citizen registration for EU ex-pat communities in the UK, featuring letters in each European language (available <u>here</u>). This is part of their <u>Vote! Vote! Vote!</u> campaign.

<u>COSPE</u> is implementing a campaign called <u>Operation Vote</u>, in order to promote participation in the European and local elections of non-national EU citizens residing in Italy. Watch their Operation Spot video in Italian with English, Polish or Romanian subtitles!

Fighting hate speech and discrimination

Our Elections, Our Europe! is a project that brings civil society organisations in Greece, Hungary and Italy together with the NGO <u>Media Diversity Institute</u>, to engage young people around a key issue to the 2014 European Elections: migration, and the importance of fighting xenophobic speech. Their campaign "*They said what?*" keeps an eye on racists politicians and responds through creativity and arts. As part of this campaign, the puppeteer Damiano Giambelli is teaching young people from different ethnic background to craft puppets and develop brief street theatre performances, where they respond to the xenophobic speech and they speak out against discrimination. They are also coordinating the campaign against racism in Parliament called <u>Your</u> <u>Vote Can Unite</u>.

Dignity for all: A report shared by Prospect Hungary Foundation and Standard Media Monitor compiles a 'list of shame' of the main exclusionists in Hungary – exclusionary speech being increasingly common in Parliament, in the media and in every day communication. Victor Spirescu, the first Romanian to arrive in Britain on January 1 after the lifting of remaining work restrictions on Romanians, is now promoting a new pro-EU party founded by UK-resident Romanians, which has been established in London as a consequence of the wave of negative reactions after this lifting of work restrictions.
