# WEEKLY UPDATE

### 30 days to the European Elections

**Romanians Abroad:** From the website of the Romanian Ministry of Foreign Affairs, you can download the list of the polling stations for Romanian citizens in the world. The list is available <u>here</u>.

**Registration Dates:** EU citizens living in Croatia, Estonia, Germany, Hungary, Latvia, Poland, Slovenia, Sweden and the UK (not nationals), and who wish to vote for MEP candidates of these countries, can still register to vote. ### Politics for People campaign

<u>ALTER-EU</u>, the alliance for Lobbying Transparency and Ethics Regulation is a coalition of about 200 civil society groups, trade unions, academics and public affairs firms concerned with the increasing influence exerted by corporate lobbyists on the political agenda in Europe, the resulting loss of democracy in EU decision-making and the postponement, weakening, or blockage even, of urgently needed progress on social, environmental and consumerprotection reforms.

Last week they launched their <u>Politics for</u> <u>People</u> campaign in 11 languages across 19 countries, to stop banks and big business taking over democracy. The aim of the campaign is to get thousands of citizens across Europe contacting their MEP candidates directly, so that when these candidates are elected, there will be a group of MEPs who will fight against excessive lobbying influence and will defend the public interest in the next European Parliament (2014-2019). Nearly 400 candidates have already signed their pledge, and ALTER-EU will closely observe the new MEPs after the elections to ensure that they stick to their promise to defend the public interest against excessive lobbying in Europe.



# <u> I Do Care – Lithuania</u>

Our friends from Man Ne Dzin have shared with us the results of last week's campaign "I Do Care" in Vilnius City Centre. Young people were invited to go to a real voting cabin standing in the city and decorated by a well-known designer. There, they had to mark in the campaign's bulletin whether they would decide for themselves or let others decide for them in the elections. ('I have never heard that people vote for the European elections, does this happen often?'), shares an interesting point of view on the lack of information faced by the voters – even in Strasbourg, seat of the European Parliament.
